31 crack houses identified in one area of Tallaght

Repeated calls have been made for additional resources to support projects

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THE Tallaght Drugs and Alcohol Task Force is commissioning a review into the changing landscape of substance misuse, with particular focus on the impact of crack cocaine on local communities.

A rise in the use of crack

cocaine has been branded a 'public health crisis' by the task force, which confirmed that 31 crack houses have been identified across one area of Tallaght alone.

In recent years, drug projects in Tallaght have been highlighting the changing drug culture in communities, particularly in relation to crack cocaine and poly drug use.
Repeated calls have been made

for additional resources to support projects in responding to emerging needs

However, despite a rise in crack cocaine use and the 'chaos' it creates in homes and communities, no additional resources have been allocated.

"We know that the drug culture has hugely changed, especially in the last 10 years," Grace Hill, TDATF co-ordinator told The

"The number one issue is crack cocaine and the related issues that impact families, and we're talking children here and future

generations.
"If you take Tallaght alone, there's been a huge change in population, deprivation and drug culture.

"People are presenting to projects with poly-drug use [using a number of substances i.e., methadone, alcohol, crack cocaine]

According to Ms Hill, those working on the ground do not believe the Government or HSE are leading programmes that reflect these changes.

"[The rise in crack cocaine use] is a public health crisis, which has serious impacts on families", she

"Crack cocaine use involves much more in a day than heroin.

"People are using more, buying more and building up more debt. "The level of chaos in people's

lives is huge. According to Ms Hill, local

drug projects are, for the first time, facing the introduction of waiting lists for services.

"I don't want to be alarmist, but [crack cocaine] is growing at an alarming rate", Ms Hill said.

"This is an emergency issue... we need a dedicated crack

cocaine programme."

Drug projects in Tallaght have responded to the best of their ability to the rise in crack cocaine

However, there is no full-time crack cocaine programme with projects struggling to deliver



existing services while responding to emerging needs, with no extra funding.
"I'm so proud of the projects

and the work that they do on the frontline... and this was recognised when they continued to work throughout the pandemic," Ms Hill said.

"However, they're not been funded as essential services and that's the reality.

"It's been 13 years since there's been any increase in funding to drug task forces."

According to TDATF, there has been a steady rise in crack cocaine use in communities, trends that have been confirmed by the communities and projects it works with.

According to Ms Hill, JADD [Jobstown Assisting Drug Dependency], for example, has identified 31 crack houses across the area of Jobstown and surrounding communities

Since January 2021, 300 people have presented to JADD for crack cocaine services.

Of the 590 clients attending JADD's harm reduction service a needle exchange programme, which includes sterile crack pipes – more than 50 per cent (300) avail of crack pipes.

Some 68 per cent of clients on JADD's methadone programme are also using crack cocaine.

'We have decided to

commission research into the changing drug culture, we're going to step back and let the data speak for itself," Ms Hill said.

"We hope to have some recommendations ready for September, and they can feed into the Budget in October.
"This is not just about the

HSE, we need a multi-agency approach."
When contacted by *The Echo*,

a spokesperson for the HSE said: "The HSE has been aware for some time about the emergence of crack cocaine as a problem in certain areas and have been producing resources to support services address this,'

the spokesperson said. "The

provision of the sterile pipes has allowed us to access a population of crack cocaine users who may not otherwise have attended our service.

"We have extended the sterile pipe provision to

other areas where the use of crack cocaine has emerged as an issue.'

The HSE is aware of the

research being conducted by the TDATF, which is currently at tender application stage.
The HSE said that the research

will 'help inform local responses
